		<p><b>Intent:</b> These changes address the need to save money, help our student-athletes stay healthy, and help our student-athletes succeed academically. The CCCTCA feels that by making these changes our sport will save the involved programs and the CCCAA substantial amounts of money. We also feel that the changes will alleviate the excessive physical demands and academic challenges we are currently placing on our most successful student-athletes. In addition to serving these needs, the proposed legislation changes will increase the exposure for our student-athletes and give our student-athletes a better chance to be rewarded for excellence in post-conference competition.</p> <p><b>Rationale:</b> The California Community College Tennis Coaches Association feels that this proposal will create several benefits for our sport and for our student-athletes. These benefits include:</p> <p><b>Cost Containment</b>—The average tennis program spends approximately \$2,122 combined on the regional and state competitions. We feel that this is an unnecessary expense. In 2011 77% of CCCs competed in the Ojai tournament and before the budget crisis over 90% of CCCs were in attendance at Ojai. By combining the regional and state competition into the Ojai (which most schools participate in already), there would be significant cost savings for individual programs, as well as for the CCCAA. The CCCAA spent \$7,465 in 2011 on the regional and state events. Those costs would be non-existent in the proposed legislation changes.</p> <p><b>Player Health and Quality of Play</b>—In our current postconference competition format, we are demanding too much physical exertion in a short amount of time. The current format forces student-athletes to compete in multiple matches on consecutive days for up to four weeks in a row. The overuse of their bodies often leads to injuries and a lower quality of play at the most important time of the season. The CCCAA Championship Handbook states “The purpose of postconference competition is to reward excellence in individual and team sports through regional and state championship competition.” In the current format, it too often can become a simple battle of attrition, in which the last one standing is often crowned state champion.</p> <p><b>Player Academics</b>—The current format forces student-athletes who qualify to compete in tournaments for four weeks in a row. Student-athletes that advance through the post-season could potentially miss four consecutive weeks of Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday classes and, in the sixteen-week semester, miss one week of final exams. By combining the regional and state competitions with the Ojai tournament, student-athletes would only miss one week of Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday classes. Also, because the season would end two weeks earlier, students-athletes attending schools on the 16-week semester would not be in danger of missing final exams.</p> <p><b>Exposure for Student-Athletes/sponsors</b>—The Ojai Invitational Tournament is the largest tennis tournament in North America in terms of participants in a single tournament. They host a broad range of divisions, ranging from boys and girls 14 and under all the way up to the Men’s Open and Pac 10 divisions. The ages, genders, and level of play all vary, but it is an amazing event for any student-athlete who is able to participate. The Ojai also has a Community College division which has been very well attended over the years. The exposure generated for our student-athletes at the Ojai Tournament would dwarf the amount of exposure they get at our current regional and state championships. Tens of thousands of fans attend the Ojai Tournament every year. If we held our regional and state championships at the Ojai, fans would watch our athletes in the same venues as they currently watch the PAC 12 Championships (Ojai has hosted the PAC 10/12 championships for over fifty years so there is a strong precedent set already). Also, university level coaches that would already be in attendance for their teams would be able to conveniently watch our athletes in person, instead of having to travel long distances to watch our regional or state championships. The same principle applies for our sponsors. The Ojai Tennis Organization has assured us that we may hang banners and advertise for our sponsors in any way that we need to. The Ojai organization has been more than cooperative with all of our requests. They have said time and time again that they will do “whatever we need them to” in order to accommodate our regional and state championships in Ojai.</p> <p><b>Effective Date:</b> <i>Originator requesting that this item be considered for cost containment, effective immediately upon CCCAA Board approval.</i></p> <p><b>Constitution Committee:</b> Filter okay. The evaluation must be conducted in the sport’s normal training or competition facility;</u></li> <li><u>2. The college may not cover any costs of the prospect related to the evaluation;</u></li> <li><u>3. The college’s currently enrolled students may not miss any class time as part of the evaluation;</u></li> <li><u>4. The prospect must show proof of a physical within the previous 12 months that meets college or district policy on such matters;</u></li> <li><u>5. The prospect must show proof of medical insurance that meets college or district policy on such matters;</u></li> <li><u>6. The prospect must sign a waiver that meets college or district policy on such matters;</u></li> <li><u>7. The prospect may participate in one evaluation per college.</u></li> </ol> <p><b>Intent:</b> Athletic evaluations, conducted in highly controlled, college-structured environments, will allow prospective student-athletes, coaching staffs and colleges opportunities to manage decisions within the recruiting process. The reality of students’ willingness to travel farther to find the best academic and athletic fit for their future means that a structured evaluation, consistent with a college’s risk management policies, is in the each groups’ best interests.</p> <p><b>Rationale:</b> With the reality of expanded recruiting and college marketing (either through web-based information, college outreach, the potential of future state-wide recruiting, etc.) prospective student-athletes from outside a college’s service area continue to make self-paid recruiting visits to our colleges. CCC coaching staffs cannot accurately assess the prospect’s chances of playing for their program without an opportunity to see the prospect perform as part of an athletic assessment.</p> <p>As such, prospects are taking a major risk in attending a college that may be far from their hometown. That risk may include significant financial commitments in housing and living expenses, or in lengthy commutes that may impact students’ academic success or their families’ budgets.</p> <p>Allowing coaches the opportunity to assess a prospect’s ability and likelihood of making the college’s team with an athletic evaluation will allow all those involved the chance to make a value-based judgment prior to such financial commitments. This will place the prospective student-athlete, their family and the coaching staff in a position to speak frankly and to make a decision most beneficial to the student.</p> <p>An athletic evaluation would be conducted in a manner consistent with that college’s risk-management policies on waivers, guests, visitors, auditing of classes, etc. As each institution is permitted the opportunity to manage their own operations and risk management policies in the most effective manner for their purposes, each college can establish protocol to permit such activities.</p> <p>The revised legislative wording specifically designates the circumstances under which an athletic evaluation may be conducted in an effort to provide maximum opportunity to students and athletic programs, while also protecting member institutions from potential liabilities. This wording also provides for equal treatment of students under all courses of study, as such evaluations of skill are routinely conducted in areas such as Dance, Music and Theater under the title of “auditions” prior to a student’s acceptance into courses requiring advanced skills. Practically and pedagogically, Intercollegiate Athletics courses require students to have advanced skills to ensure the highest caliber of instruction and the</p>
