Preferably one (1) protest committee member will be selected from the visiting team's community, whenever possible. The host athletic director should choose protest committee members who are unbiased and knowledgeable about the sport. No coaches (from the same sport) representing an institution in the event can serve on the protest committee. If the MC Sport Representative is onsite, it is recommended that he/she be a member of the protest committee.</p> <p>C. It is recommended that the protest committee be onsite 30 minutes prior to the competition.</p> <p>D. The contest shall not begin until all members of a qualified protest committee of three (3) have been introduced to each coach.</p> <p>E. Protest committee decisions must be made immediately at the time of the protest.</p> <p>The penalty for failing to comply with A through E shall result in a warning in the form of a report forwarded to the CCCAA and the respective affiliate association. Upon receipt of this report, the CCCAA Board Chair shall convey in writing to the host college president that the athletic administrator failed to comply with CCCAA regulations. Two (2) infractions shall result in forfeiting their next opportunity to host a postconference competition event in that sport.</p>			

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		<p>6.13.2 Issues covered by sport playing rules are to be determined by the officials assigned to the game. Exception: In track and field, per NCAA rules, an appointed Jury of Appeal by the Games Committee will rule on all protests of the meet referees' decisions only. (Adopted April 2, 2009; effective July 1, 2009.)</p> <p>— Protests, CCCAA rule violations, eligibility, and decorum issues are to be immediately resolved onsite by the Protest Committee so that the postconference competition structure can continue with the appropriate team(s) advancing. (Adopted April 2, 2009; effective July 1, 2009.)</p> <p>6.13.3 In order for this to occur in the best possible manner, a protest committee (comprised of knowledgeable people who are in attendance and cognizant first-hand of the event), shall have the authority to resolve any questions. Appealing to the Office of the CCCAA Executive Director after the fact creates a situation where involved teams are unaware of which team(s) will advance and permits the involvement of outside factions, lobbying efforts, and secondhand information being used as evaluative measures.
