It will be reevaluated after this time. Thus Women's Basketball will be a test case for this legislation.</u></p> <p>There is no current regulation to verify the residency status for a student athlete. This will require this residency verification that is currently being done by some, but not all, colleges. It will also insure that, if a college board elects to waive out-of-state or international tuition for a student athlete, this waiver cannot be based in any part on the fact that the student is an athletic team participant.</p> <p style="text-align: center;"><i>continued on next page</i></p>	<u>Rationale:</u> From college to college there is a discrepancy in the way they verify the residency of their students. Thus an out-of-state or international student athlete could be required to pay out-of-state or international tuition at one college but not at another college, where these residency verification rules are not enforced. <u>Gender Equity Impact:</u> None. <u>Financial Impact:</u> This would not affect the college budget for any college that currently follows these state residency verification guidelines and some already do this verification. For those colleges that do not enforce these residency guidelines, it would require that the athletic eligibility person secure high school transcripts for all athletes and follow these guidelines. Since most colleges have a minimal number of out-of-state or international student athletes, this should not significantly increase the workload for this individual. 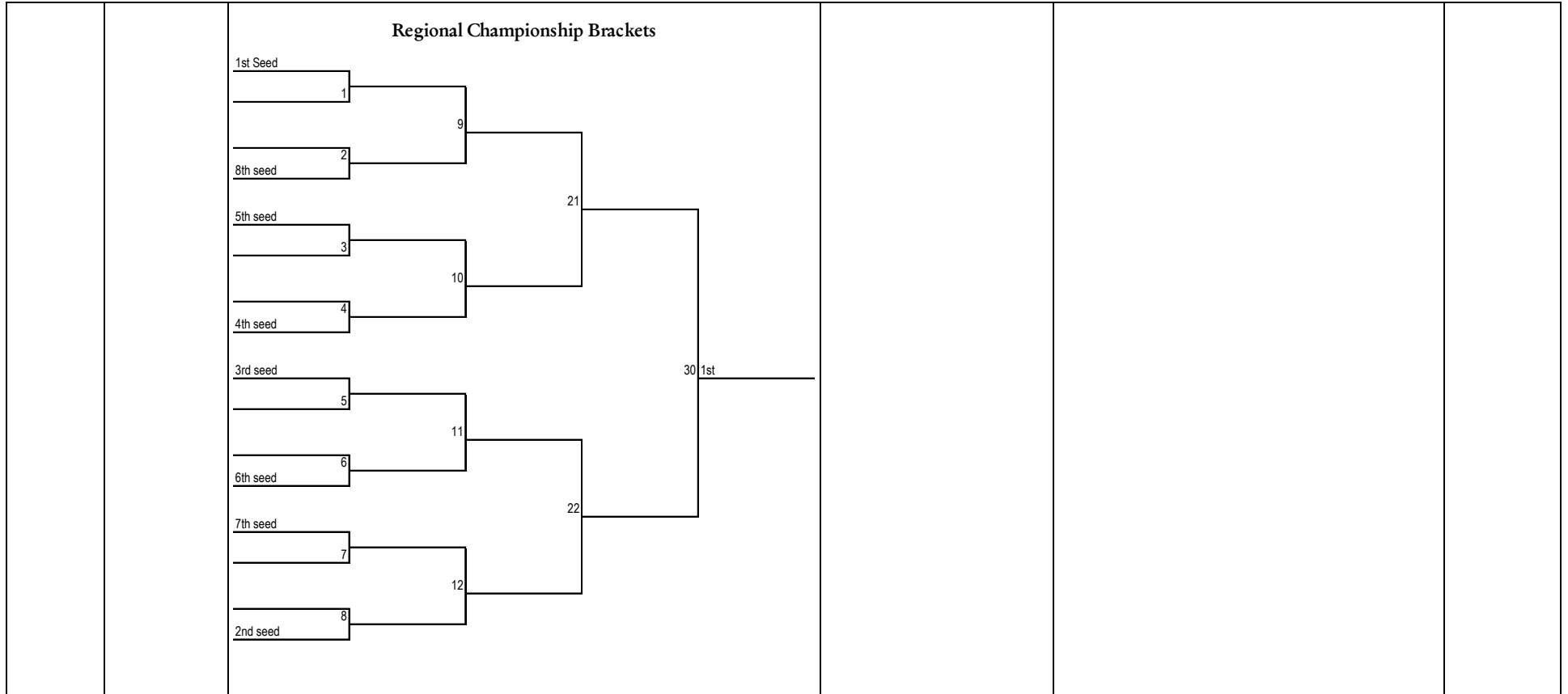

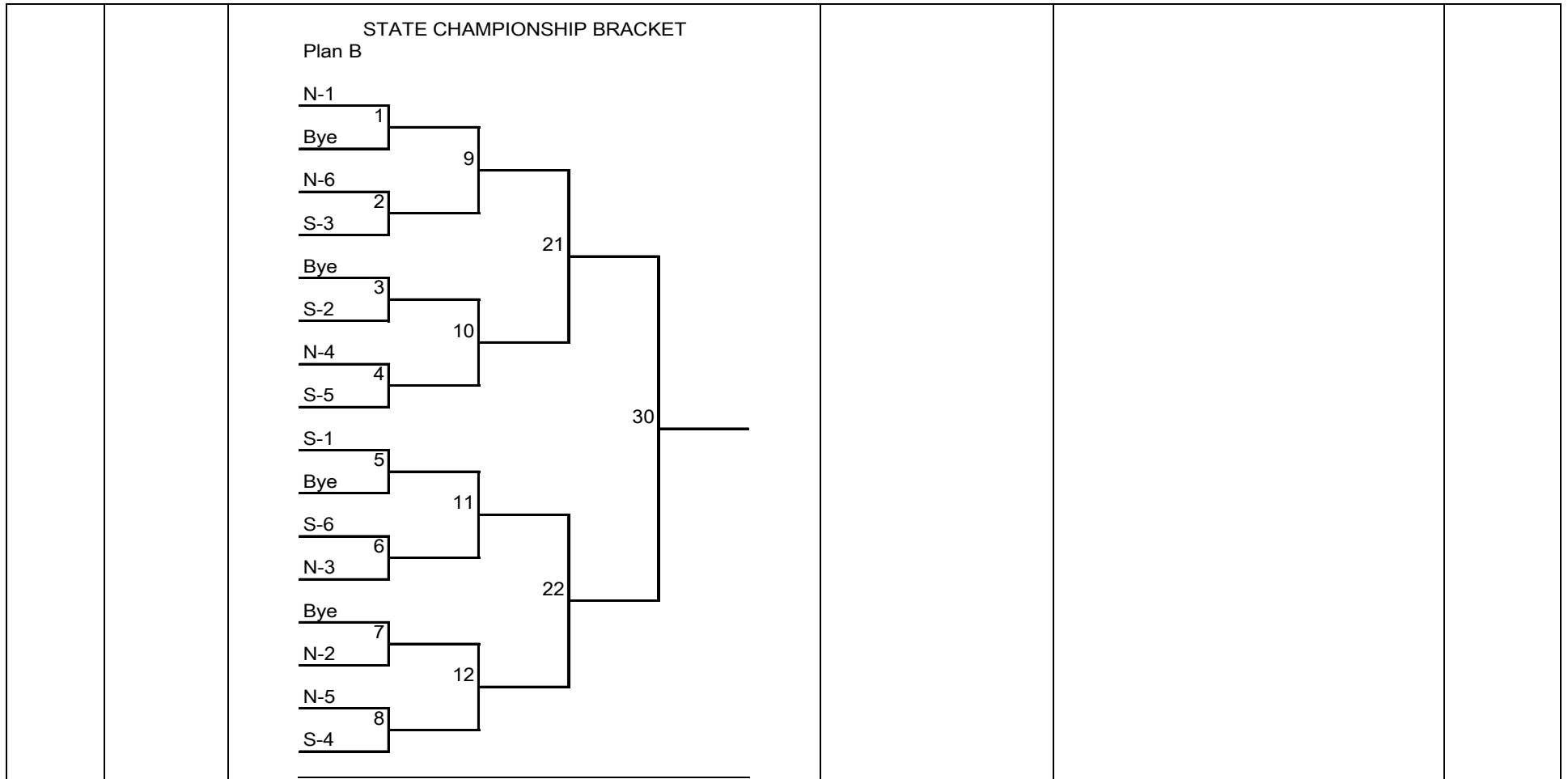
