A. CALL TO ORDERJackie Fisher, Sr., Chair

The meeting was called to order by Chair Jackie Fisher at 8:03AM, and a quorum was established. Board members present:

B. ADDITIONS TO AGENDA.....Jackie Fisher, Sr.

- ❖ Agenda item J.2. Southern California Reconferencing Proposal was pulled by Chair Fisher. It was moved, seconded, and motion carried (**MSC**) to approve pulling agenda item J.2. by unanimous vote of the board.

Notes:

- Reconferencing Proposals will not be on the Board agenda.
- Cost Containment proposals and discussions will continue.
- Cost Containment and Conferencing Committee will now be changed to Cost Containment Committee focusing on cost containment only. It was noted that President McKinley Williams will remain as chair. The new composition of the Cost Containment Committee membership will be decided later.
- College wishing to change its conference membership shall follow existing process as listed in Bylaw 5.

Chair Fisher thanked the members of the Cost Containment and Conferencing Committee and COA/CCCAA Staff for their work in preparing the report.

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Cost Containment and Conferencing Committee Chair McKinley Williams also voiced appreciation for the efforts of Committee members. (Pam Walker, Dave Evans, Paul Moore, Shirley Baskin, Mike Liddell, Logan McKechnie, Dale Murray, Dean Crowley, Phil Maas, John Keever, John Woods, Rich Kollen, and Jerry White)

- ❖ It was **MSC** to approve the change from “B. Additions to Agenda” to “B. Approval of the Agenda” for future Board agenda.
- ❖ New Board member, Kathryn Jeffery, President - Sacramento City College, representing the Big Eight Conference, was introduced and welcomed.

C. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

It was **MSC** to approve the COA Board meeting minutes from February 17, 2010.

D. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Commissioner Logan McKechnie, on behalf of the commissioners, requested the COA Board look into insurance issues for the conferences. He stated each conference currently buys its own insurance and the commissioners enforce the rules of the COA. Hence, the conferences should be covered by the same policy as the Board. COA Executive Director Carlyle Carter responded that he will seek legal counsel’s advice regarding this request.

E. REPORTS

1. COA Board Chair Jackie Fisher, Sr.

- ❖ Program Review: Chair Fisher attended the Conference Commissioners Workshop on March 31, 2010. He recommended that institutions with football programs share their program review results and recommendations with their regional football commissioners, Jim Sartoris and Gary Kollenborn, as soon as possible.
- ❖ COA/CCCAA Convention: Chair Fisher expressed his gratitude to Carlyle Carter and the COA/CCCAA staff for the well-run convention. He stated that he enjoyed meeting the students, Hall of Fame inductees, and distinguished 2010 members at the recognition banquets.
- ❖ Cost Containment and Student Success: Chair Fisher stressed that although cost containment is the top issue of the COA/CCCAA at this economically challenging time, student success should be the number one priority. Shasta College President Gary Lewis also pointed out the significant savings of about \$1.5 million from reduction in the number of contests. He stated that in addition to moving forward with additional cost-saving measures, members need to communicate with others throughout the state, especially within their own college, in terms of what the athletic department has done in reducing the cost; for example, reduction of the number of contests, reduction of number of schools advancing to the state championships, and other cost-saving measures.

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- ❖ CEOCCC Meeting: Community College League of California President/Chief Executive Officer Scott Lay has requested Chair Fisher and Mr. Carter meet with the Chief Executive Officers of the California Community Colleges (CEOCC) on April 16 to discuss the issue of conferencing. Chair Fisher and Mr. Carter plan to share with the CEOCCC the Association's cost containment efforts and achievements in the process, as well as plans for the future.

2. Executive Director Carlyle Carter

- ❖ Information Monitoring and Sharing: Mr. Carter reported that it has been a challenging year since the last convention. The COA/CCCAA office continues to monitor the state's movement via Budget Conference Committee meetings, the legislature, and certain agencies that are looking at CCC athletics and physical education. The COA/CCCAA office has also attempted to inform membership of certain threats and has worked with members in establishing strategies to counter the threats.
- ❖ National Representation: Mr. Carter continues representing the Association at NCAA and NATYCAA meetings. A significant amount of time and effort has been devoted to working with the NCAA in dealing with some of the repercussions of academic reform. On March 31, 2010, NCAA Managing Director of Academic and Membership Affairs Diane Dickman held a NCAA Review of Two-Year College Transfer Regulations Workshop at our convention. She presented the membership with the most recent data that identified the success and lack of success of two-year student athletes. A copy of the presentation will be posted on the COA/CCCAA website.

Together with West Valley College Academic Advisor (also chair of the N4A Two-Year College Representative) Wanda Wong, Mr. Carter had the opportunity to attend a meeting of the NCAA Division I Academic Cabinet, which is primarily composed of NCAA faculty athletic representatives. The Cabinet discussed the impact of NCAA legislation on two-year college student athletes. Mr. Carter is very pleased to be invited back to join the Cabinet's June meeting to develop recommendations for the two-year college transfer student athletes.

Mr. Carter has also scheduled a meeting with the NJCAA and NWAC which will occur sometime during April 17-18, 2010, at the American Association of Community Colleges (AACC) Convention in Seattle.

- ❖ Online Compliance Exam: The exam is now available online. Mr. Carter thanked COA/CCCAA Director of Membership Services Debra Wheeler for her assistance in creating the exam. Mr. Carter noted that the exam is an open-book test. It is an educational tool for the membership, created to assist athletic directors as they provide annual compliance workshops for their staff.
- ❖ New Legislative Process: Director of Membership Services Wheeler has also worked extensively on the new electronic voting system for the legislative session. Appreciation and gratitude were extended to Ms. Wheeler. Mr. Carter pointed out that this convention marked the first time that the membership had an active role in voting on legislation of the Association.

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- ❖ Championship Operations: CCCAA Director of Championship George Mategakis has done a tremendous job in setting up and conducting a series of teleconferences for each championship. The calls involve the athletic director of the host institution, event manager, representative(s) from the sport coaches association, Management Council sport representative, and support staff. The conference calls have been very helpful in disseminating information.
- ❖ Ongoing Projects: CCCAA Assistant Director of Sports Information and Communications Jason Boggs continues to work on updating information for each conference page and the COA/CCCAA website. COA Administrative Assistant Rima Trotter continues to work on updating high schools within each CCC district. Mr. Carter commended her on the job as this is a very difficult task with frequent information updates. Ms. Trotter has sent out a list of updated high schools to all the athletic directors for their review. Meanwhile, a newly created map of community college districts is available via the collaborative effort between the Association and the GIS staff. Mr. Carter noted that this marks the first time that there is an accurate map showing the boundaries of the community college districts. The map will allow members to accurately access contiguous districts, as well as high schools within the districts. The COA/CCCAA office will establish a link to the new map.
- ❖ Proposed Event Budgets and Financial Statements: Mr. Carter reminded the membership that until the COA/CCCAA office receives all the financial reports and the net proceeds from postconference events, it will be impossible to provide potential reimbursement to participating colleges. Members are strongly recommended to submit those reports in timely fashion. Mr. Carter stated that policy requires a \$25/day late fee for everyday after the financial report is due in hope of improving the reimbursement process.
- ❖ Infraction: The Association continues working with the commissioners in finalizing an infractions report which will be posted online.
- ❖ Statewide statistics: The Association continues to work with CCC Sports Information Association, conferences, and CCC Coaches Association in an attempt to facilitate statewide statistics. Mr. Boggs is primarily responsible for this task.
- ❖ Convention: Mr. Carter thanked all the COA/CCCAA staff for their work and help in coordinating the activities during the convention.
- ❖ Membership Support: This marks the end of Mr. Carter's fifth year serving as COA executive director. Mr. Carter extended a personal thank you to everyone who has understood and supported his vision for the Association.

3. CCCAA Management Council (MC) Chair Dave Evans

- ❖ Branding Session: MC Chair Evans reported that the MC had a productive meeting this week. The MC had a retreat on March 29, 2010, from 11:30 AM to 6 PM. The retreat session was geared towards branding, image, and an identity workshop which was facilitated by Velvet Suites Marketing Group President Melissa Dawn Johnson. The goal of the session was to educate, equip, and empower the CCCAA MC with orientation and strategy session on strategic brand leadership. MC Chair Evans stated that with the help

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of Mr. Carter and Ms. Wheeler, the MC is going to see this branding effort through, with the goal of providing tools that will benefit the membership in terms of branding and leadership concepts. He thanked Mr. Carter for bringing in the Velvet Suites Marketing Group and facilitating this process.

- ❖ Reconferencing Process: On March 30, 2010, the MC had an hour and forty-five-minute meeting to learn and discuss the methodology used to collect data for the reconferencing process. MC Chair Evans noted that a lot of effort has been put toward the data collection. Even though the reconferencing proposal has been pulled from the agenda, MC Chair Evans stated that the data collected and the tools used can still aid the membership greatly for any direction the Association decides to go in the future. He thanked the Cost Containment and Conferencing Committee and the COA/CCCAA staff for their hard work.
- ❖ MC Committees: MC Chair Evans reported that all MC Committees have been working hard and have been very productive; the Competition Committee reviews governing rules and processes for CCCAA sport championships and is chaired by MC Vice Chair Jim Forkum; the Gender Equity Committee provides leadership on gender equity issues and is chaired by Cypress College PE Division Chair Diane Henry; and the Postconference Competition Review Committee reviews all proposed legislation which directly affects postconference competition and is chaired by Cerritos College Dean of Health and PE Dan Smith. The MC has established a new committee, Bylaw 2 Review Committee (chaired by Antelope Valley College Dean of PE and Athletics Newton Chelette), which focuses on recruiting. This new Committee is expected to present recommendations by next fall.
- ❖ New Legislative Process: MC Chair Evans stated that this new productive process is needed as every institution has a primary person delegated to vote. He also thanked the CCCAA staff.
- ❖ CCCADA Executive Membership: MC Chair Evans commended the executive leadership of the CCC Athletic Directors Association; special gratitude was extended to the CCCADA President Bob Clement. As stated, the CCCADA has empowered individual representatives from each conference and has become a great channel to get input for the Association.
- ❖ MC Business Meeting: Reports from liaisons for each individual sport and affiliate organization were given at the business meeting on April 1, 2010. Each MC Representative has worked very hard and will continue to work for the benefit of the membership. MC Chair Evans applauded their efforts. At the meeting, the MC endorsed cost containment recommendations from its committees for the following sports: men's and women's basketball, women's volleyball, water polo, wrestling, and football. All these recommendations will be forwarded to and reviewed by the COA Cost Containment Committee.

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F. COMMITTEE REPORTS

1. Academic and Athletic Standards Review Committee (AASRC)

COA Executive Director Carter reported that the Committee has encountered difficulty in getting together and moving forward. He stated that the Association now has a liaison from the CCC Chancellor's Office: Vice Chancellor Academic Affairs Barry Russell. Mr. Russell has indicated his support for providing statewide report of student-athlete academic progress.

2. Awards Committee

COA Board Chair Fisher commented on the success of the COA/CCCAA Scholar-Athletes Luncheon, held on March 31, 2010. He reminded members of the Association's true purpose: to serve the student athletes. The selection of the female and male scholar athletes is a direct reflection of work by the Committee and also those institutions which submitted the nominations. The students' academic success highlights the value of athletics and academics within the CCC to the state legislature. Chair Fisher reminded members of the upcoming NATYCAA Scholar-Athlete Award and encouraged them to submit nominations before deadline.

3. Finance Committee Chair Thomas Fallo reported that the Committee has not met since the last Board meeting. The Committee will meet prior to the next Board meeting to review budget for the next fiscal year.

4. Constitution Committee

Committee member Dale Murray reported that the Committee is in the process of reviewing the constitution and trying to clarify the role of COA Executive Director. The Executive Director's role in reviewing sanctions by the conferences was deemed to be ambiguous. He added that any time an institution asks for a clarification of a bylaw from Mr. Carter, the interpretation given is not just from Mr. Carter exclusively. The Constitution Committee is resource for the executive director. Typically, there would be three to four days of email exchanges among the Committee members before an interpretation is issued.

5. Policy Committee Chair Ned Doffoney thanked the CCCAA staff for keeping the Committee up to date during the legislative session. He reported a summary pertaining to policy items from the Legislative Session held on April 1, 2010:

- **P-1-S09:** Article 1.5.4.G, Appendix B, Form R-1, and Form R-4 - to comply with state and federal laws of Title IX (effective date: July 1, 2010) → supported by the membership with a 99 percent vote of approval.

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- **COA-1-F09:** Article 6.2.4 - to ensure that affiliate organizations do not make decisions that will impact the budget of membership (effective date: July 1, 2010) → supported by the membership with a 94 percent vote of approval.
- **P-12-F09:** Bylaw 1.3.7 - to provide for an earlier start on fulfilling individual educational plans (effective date: July 1, 2010) → not supported by the membership with an 86.6 percent vote of disapproval.
- **P-14-F09:** Bylaws 3.5.2 and 3.11, Basketball – to change practice start date to October 1 (effective date: July 1, 2010) → supported by the membership with a 67.9 percent vote of approval.
- **P-16-F09:** Bylaw 3.16.D, Track & Field – to allow maximum exposure of a California Community College athlete in the world arena by adding the World Championships (effective date: July 1, 2010) → supported by the membership with a 100 percent vote of approval.
- **P-17-F09:** Bylaws 6.8.2 and 6.12.2 – to make the language about designation of the PC event manager consistent in both sections of Bylaw 6 (effective date: July 1, 2010) → supported by the membership with a 99 percent vote of approval.

This was Chancellor Doffoney's second-to-last meeting. He was thanked for his tremendous service to the COA Board.

6. **Cost Containment and Conferencing Committee Chair McKinley Williams** thanked the COA/CCCAA staff for creating the conferencing tools. He believes the tools will be beneficial in assisting the membership in terms of looking at travel costs across the state. He noted that the new Cost Containment Committee will certainly entertain the MC's recommendations and the Committee is looking forward to starting its deliberation on the recommendations.

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Connie Sears - Long Beach City College Women's Athletic Director to serve as Water Polo Representative.

Len Mohney - College of the Canyons Dean of PE to serve as Baseball Representative.

Mark Gritton - West Hills College – Coalinga Athletic Director to serve as Football Representative.

Gary Kollenborn - Northern California Football Association Commissioner to serve as Conference Commissioner Representative.

H. LEGISLATION

(Article 8.3.8.5.4) *COA BOARD OVERRIDE*—The COA Board may, by a three-quarters ($\frac{3}{4}$) majority vote, override the membership's adoption or defeat of any proposed amendment. The vote to override must occur during the first regularly scheduled COA Board meeting following the Business/Legislative Session when the amendment was approved or defeated by the membership. The COA Board shall notify the membership within 15 days of its action to override an adopted or defeated amendment.

It was **MSC** to accept the legislation as adopted for the body during the Legislative Session.

Chair Fisher requested that American River College Dean of PE Jean Snuggs form a group to conduct a survey on the timeliness for educational plans and that Mr. Carter communicate and work with Ms. Snuggs on this task.

I. OLD BUSINESS

1. Santa Barbara City College: rescindment of extended recruiting area for all sports, except for Football

Based on recommendations made by COA/CCCAA Binding Arbitration Panel on October 8, 2009, Santa Barbara City College (SBCC) President Andreea Serban requested that the Board rescind the redefined permissible recruiting area for all SBCC sports, except for football, during the COA Board Meeting on February 17, 2010. At the time the Board felt further discussion was needed, so this request was brought back for the April Board Meeting. Both President Serban and Mr. Carter reiterated SBCC's case and its process starting from SBCC's first request for appeal on the COA Board Agenda of August 28, 2009. President Lewis stated that the Binding Arbitration Panel made recommendations to the Board, and those recommendations were not binding decisions. Ultimately, it is the Board which has the authority to make the decision.

It was **MSFAILED** (with one abstention) to approve the request to rescind the redefined permissible recruiting area for all SBCC sports (note: the request did not include football).

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J. NEW BUSINESS

1. Review of Saddleback College Study on the Academic Progress of Student Athletes

Saddleback College President Tod Burnett presented to the Board the Saddleback College academic progress report of student athletes (from fall 2003 to spring 2009) and stressed the importance of sharing this information statewide. Please see supplement. The report shows:

- the units earned by student athletes while in-season is higher than those earned while off-season.
- the overall average of student-athlete success rate is 76.76 percent.
- In general, student athletes have better academic performance (based on GPA) during in-season. President Burnett noted that this is likely due to students getting more attention from teachers, coaches, advisors, and staff during in-season.

Chair Fisher recommended adding CCC Sports Information Association President to the AASRC membership. He also recommended Saddleback College share this study with other CCC athletic directors, so that the athletic directors can review and provide additional information to the study. Then, an electronic copy of data compiled should be submitted to the COA/CCCAA office. Mr. Carter can work with the AASRC to put together the data and disseminate the information statewide.

President Lewis stated full-time student athletes have shown greater success than the part-time student athletes. He also added an example of student success noting that one of his former student athletes is now a neurosurgeon at UC Davis.

Mr. Carter hopes to receive an electronic template of data collection from the Chancellor's office in the near future. He pointed out that Bobby McDonald, a member of the Board of Governors, who was our convention keynote, had attended the Scholar-Athlete Luncheon. The COA/CCCAA office will provide Mr. McDonald Scholar-Athlete Luncheon booklets and also a three-year snapshot of student athletes and 3C4A award winners. Mr. McDonald will take the information and prepare a report for the Board of Governors. Mr. Carter is also scheduled to be on the Board of Governor's agenda for its upcoming meeting. It is a proactive approach to provide information on CC athletics. Mr. Carter will work with the Board to draft a letter for the Board of Governors and the Chancellor's Office with regard to student-athlete success.

2. Southern California Reconferencing Proposal

The item was pulled. On behalf of Allan Hancock, Bakersfield, and Cuesta Colleges; Cuesta College Athletic Director Bob Mariucci thanked the Board for understanding and listening to their concerns.

3. Request for Out-of-State Recruiting Waiver from (please note that all requests are for unrestricted out-of-state recruiting unless otherwise stated on the request letter):

It was **MSC** to approve the out-of-state recruiting waiver request for the following Colleges for five years (July 1, 2010 to June 30, 2015).

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- a. Barstow Community College
- b. Feather River College
- c. Lassen College
- d. College of the Siskiyous
- e. Taft College

4. Pacific Coast Athletic Conference: request for Hearing Board composition

It was noted that there is no need to request on an annual basis approval to have a different composition from the composition defined by the COA/CCCAA Constitution and Bylaws. It was MSC to approve the request for Hearing Board composition from Pacific Coast Athletic Conference.

Barstow College is up for review of its' out-of-state recruiting waiver, and wishes to continue the waiver for another five years. According to the COA Constitution Bylaw 2.5.2, a district may be granted a waiver to the restriction against out-of-state recruiting, if the State Commissioner verifies that the district's fall enrollment(head count) in the most recently completed academic year was 5,000 or less, and the following:

The number of high schools which offer athletic programs in the district's recruiting area is eighty six(86) and the state average is one hundred and fourteen(114). Barstow College is well below the state average which satisfies Bylaw 2.5A.

Barstow College also satisfies Bylaw 2.5.2B, by bordering the State of Nevada.

Barstow College student-athlete enrollment has doubled since I came here two years ago as we have added women's softball and are preparing to add women's volleyball and men's and women's soccer. Our current sport offerings are: Cross Country Men and Women, Men's and Women's Basketball, Baseball and Softball. Without the out-of-state recruiting waiver this would not have been possible and in order to continue the growth of our programs we need the waiver to continue.

Our relationship with Nevada schools is invaluable as about 50% of our student-athletes are from Nevada schools, a bordering state. We have very few athletes from states other than Nevada. In total there only 4 student-athletes that come from states other than California or Nevada. We don't plan on changing that. The out-of-state recruiting waiver is used most entirely for the ability to recruit our neighboring Nevada residents because our district has a "Good Neighbor Policy", whereas Nevada residents only pay around \$45 per unit for tuition.



Our district was considering doing away with all Athletic programs as recently as two years ago. The increased numbers of student-athletes and athletic teams on our campus has brought a whole new enthusiasm and attitude to our campus. Thanks for all you do for athletics in the State of California.



Greetings Commissioner Carter and COA Management Council:

Please accept this letter as a formal request to allow Feather River Community College (District) an Out-of-State Waiver per Bylaw **2.5.2**. As the Bylaw states,
Upon written request from the college's chief executive officer to the COA Executive Director, a college may be granted a waiver to the restriction against out-of-state recruiting, if the COA Executive Director verifies that the college's fall enrollment (headcount) in the most recently completed academic year was 5,000 or less, AND (Adopted & effective October 17, 2008.)

- A. The number of high schools which offer athletic programs in the district's recruiting area is less than the statewide average of high schools per recruiting area*, **OR**
- B. The district shares a geographic boundary with another state (COA Bylaw 2.5.2)
**(Statewide average is 18 schools)*

Our headcount for fall 2009 was 2,307; and the District neighbors with the State of Nevada as well. Moreover, Feather River College's recruiting area consists of 5 high schools: Quincy H.S., Portola H.S., Chester H.S., Greenville H.S. and Plumas Christian H.S. The combined graduating seniors for these 5 local high schools amounted to less than 300 for 2008/2009. It is impractical for our small community college to be expected to thrive, much less survive, should even 90% of the average graduating senior classes attend Feather River College. The college offers 10 intercollegiate opportunities for its enrolled student body, and the unique nature of our small community and its isolation from urban areas (over 80 miles either way on mountainous Hwy. 70) creates a distinct challenge for our coaching staff. Our two closest contiguous recruiting areas are Oroville and Susanville and both are located approximately 80 miles away. Both cities have California Community Colleges located in them—Butte College and Lassen College. We believe this waiver will allow FRC the necessary ingredient to maintain a healthy and diverse, as well as competitive, athletic program. This waiver is instrumental in keeping our athletic programs operating and will help prevent the elimination of programs due to low roster numbers.

FRCC District asks that you determine that Feather River College qualifies under Bylaw 2.5.2, to have "No Restrictions Outside of California," allowing us to continue to supplement our student-body with out-of-state enrollment through this waiver. Our sports programs have been instrumental in providing a much-needed, culturally rich campus environment.

RE: Request for Waiver of COA Out-of-State Recruitment Restrictions

This is to request continuance of the out-of-state recruiting waiver for the West Kern Community College District (Taft College). As you may surmise, the circumstances prompting our initial request remain the same. Our single college campus enrollment is significantly less than 5,000 and our recruiting area includes only 32 high schools with athletic programs compared to the state average of 115.

Additionally, the following factors greatly affect our ability to attract an adequate number of student athletes to field our teams:

- * Taft College is a small and isolated college that must compete with much larger contiguous districts. The population centers of two contiguous districts are several miles from our campus and are separated by mountain passes. This makes it virtually impossible to establish ties with high school athletic programs and recruit students from those areas.
- * Central Coast high school students in our two contiguous districts (San Luis Obispo and Allan Hancock) have consistently demonstrated their lack of interest in the climate of the San Joaquin Valley.
- * Bakersfield College (located in our contiguous district to the east) is ten times the size of Taft College. This fact, coupled with Bakersfield College's very strong ties with Kern County high school programs, has made it difficult to recruit student athletes from that area in spite of our concentrated efforts.

Without the waiver, Taft College will not be able to continue its intercollegiate sports program. With only 200 graduates yearly from the district's two high schools and the inability to attract students from the contiguous districts, we will not have the student

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participation level needed to compete in intercollegiate sports. Without a sports program, a significant element of the community college learning experience will be lost. It is for these reasons that Taft College requests continuation of the out-of-state recruiting waiver.
